
We have our own professional team as well, so the choice of a major stage race to

Race Jerseys

Apart from the colourful assortment of team jerseys, there are some special ones to look out for. These are worn by the riders who are leading different competitions within the race and are presented at the start of stages two, three and four.




YELLOW JERSEY — worn by the overall leader of the Elswick Centennial He is the man whose overall time is the lowest, so this is the most prestigious jersey in the race. Sponsored by Elswick Hopper Ltd.



RED JERSEY — worn by the man leading the "King of the Mountains" competition. This is based on points for climbing designated hills or "primes" during each stage. Sponsored by Elsmar Distributors.



PINK JERSEY — worn by the rider finishing consistently higher up the field than any other — the points leader. It's decided by totalling each rider's daily position, the one with the lowest total of points taking the jersey. Sponsored by Regina SICC.



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
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Men to Watch

ONE MAN ABOVE ALL heads the list of danger-men, and not for nothing do they call Sid Barras "Supersid". He's at home in all kinds of racing — in short-circuit criterium events, in sprint finishes, in stage races. But most of all he's tough, and the gruelling final stage will suit him fine. In a smaller team this year (Weinmann-Chicken) he nevertheless has two top-class team mates in Keith Lambert and Reg Smith, and if Sid plays the decoy, either of those could end up top man in Glasgow.

First winner of the pro season was Ian Banbury, now in his third professional year and settled down to the demanding business of making your living from two wheels. He's a fast finisher too, and has been getting stronger as he gets older. MAN-VW-Viking will be relying on him and on Yorkshire man Dudley Hayton, an old sparring partner of Sid Barras and, like Sid, at

home over all kinds of terrain.

Elswick-Falcon have a crafty old fox in Barry Hoban, their star signing for 1980, but Barry — who spends most of his year in Belgium — will be a marked man. It could end with Liverpudlian Bill Nickson being the Falcon "front man" — remember, as an amateur he was the last Briton to win the Milk Race, Britain's premier amateur event.

Being in a big team has immense advantages, but riders like Ian Hallam and Phil Bayton (both KP Crisps-Viscount) and Steve Heffernan (Keymead-Stanco) are fast enough to snatch stage finishes and clever enough to benefit from the in-fighting between the big teams.

This event is the first major pro-am clash of the year, and Britain's best unpaid roadmen are included in the field. In Great Britain colours Londoner Bob Downs has the experience to gain a high overall placing, and Yorkshire's Des Fretwell can run even Barras close in the sprints. But in Mark Bell and Pete Longbottom there are two young talented riders who have their eyes firmly fixed on Moscow and are already halfway there on past performances.

In the England team, Joe Waugh is noted for his climbing powers, and since he's from

South Shields, it's obvious where he'll be making his move.

Normally pro-am racing means one amateur team among a field of professionals, but with four amateur teams this time the battle should be much more intense. For even though the cashmen don't want their professional rivals to win, I suspect that having an amateur winner would be a disaster. Which makes for better racing all round.
